Principal's Message



As I write this Principal's message, we have already finished the graduation celebrations for the class of 2010 and are busy working on timetabling courses for next September. I'd like to express my thanks for all time that parents volunteered to make both the Night to Remember and the Dry Grad after the prom memorable events for our grads. As our semester draws to a close, we are saying our official goodbyes to a number of staff members who are retiring. We wish Mrs. Tavener, Mr. Klassen and Mrs. Darrell good health and new adventures as they retire.

As June 18th and the

end of regular classes approaches, the time to focus on year end exams also approaches. Final exams begin on June 21st, and all students must write their exams at the scheduled time. An exam schedule is included in this newsletter.

Because school and provincial exams account for 20% of the final mark for students in grades 9 to 11, it is very important that they prepare for them. Provincial exams for Grade 12 students begin on June 21st, and account for 40% of their final mark.

This year's grade 12 class has a number of students who can still qualify for \$1000 provincial

scholarships, but they must work hard to prepare for their provincial exams. With the warmer weather here, it is going to take much more support and prodding to keep students focused. These are stressful times, so I recommend that families look for ways to support your children as they prepare for their finals. It can be helpful to work out a family routine that will provide students with a quiet study environment over the next couple of weeks. Remember, the post secondary school and program they may enter will be determined by how well they do on their final exams.

Year-End Information for Parents

Year end activities in secondary schools across the district are now focused on preparation for exams and examination completion. Schools will administer final classroom assessments in all subjects as well as provincial government examinations in grades 10, 11 and 12.

Parents should understand that schools have no control over provincial examination dates and that these dates affect most of the decisions concerning secondary school activities at this time of the year. All secondary schools will be administering a full slate of school examinations in grades 9, 10, and 11 as well as grade 12; the schedule has been set by a district committee.

All secondary schools will end classes on June 18. On June 17, textbooks are returned and lockers are emptied prior to the beginning of the examination period.

All examinations, district and provincial, begin on June 21 and conclude on June 29.

Only students writing exams need attend school on these days.

During the examination period, schools will be open regular school hours.

Unless students are writing an exam or working directly with a teacher, we do not expect them at school. Because the library is often used for electronic exams, it is not always available as a place for students to study. Exams are being written in many areas of the building and it is important that we have no disruptions. We recommend that students arrive 15 minutes before their exam starts; if they arrive earlier, they may be asked to wait outside so that exam sessions are not disturbed.

All secondary students on the Graduation Program (10-12) may arrange to write or re-write provincial examinations at the Abbotsford Summer School. 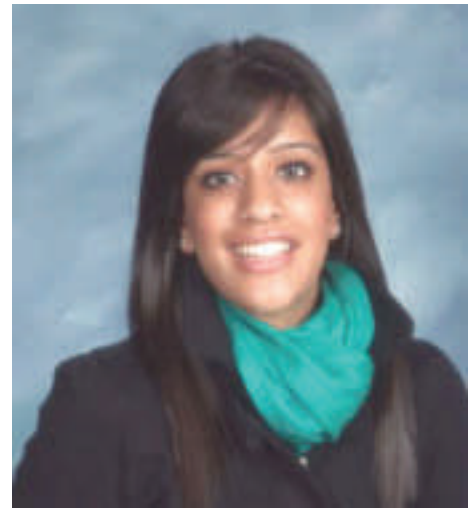
Social Justice Students Raise \$4000

Thank you Mouat for all of your enthusiastic support this year! The Social Justice 12 classes have been busy organizing events for various causes. By starving themselves for 24 hours, the students raised \$4000 for the Abbotsford Cyrus Center. Heaping bags of clothes were hand delivered to the Covenant House to help homeless youth. Over 800 hands were printed as a part of the petition to stop human trafficking and pass Bill C-268. By bringing the zoo to Mouat, awareness was raised about having exotic animals as pets as well as raising funds to stop animal trafficking. To support the value of education, the students raised money to build a classroom in India. For MCC, the students raised 100 Kits for Kids. Dozens of library books were purchased for a school in Laos. Art supplies were sent to Mouat's sister school in Kenya. Valedictory Message by Cody Friesen

In theatre there is an image that my teacher, Mr Edwards, always stressed: the iceberg. Now, whenever we look at an iceberg, the top is all we see. But, underneath there is more than we can imagine. Approximately 7/8ths of the iceberg's mass is underwater. Now, as actors, we have rehearsals, costume fittings, inner monologues about our characters, read-throughs, method acting, and much more than what the audience sees. Much of that is related to us as a grad class. When most people see us Mouat grads, they only see the surface, never the stuff that goes on behind the scenes. Parents, teachers, administrators, board members, honored guests, trustees, and most importantly, the graduating class of 2010: it is time to reveal the other 7/8ths of our class.

Every grad class is different in its own and special way. But, once the grad class picture is plastered against the wall, and the graduates move on, they just become another 'grad class'. However, that is only the tip of this iceberg. In a land of Facebook junkies and texting addicts, there has arisen a grad class that Mouat has never seen before. We have a reputation: a well coached and top ranked football team, wrestling girls who can take Hulk Hogan any day, theatre-junkied nerds just waiting for their next hit of 'drama', a tenacious and aggressive girls' basketball team, followed by a boys' basketball team which is known for their "brotherhood", an art program that unlocks, discovers, and inspires creativity. A talent-laden music scene that is destined for stardom; most of us can speak French, German, Spanish, Korean, or Punjabi, and hopefully, English; a track team that consistently puts Mouat on the map; a technology program that prepares us for the world to come -- by the way can someone teach me how to change a tire? A swim team that can drive Michael Phelps out of the pool, our globetrotting mouat rugby team, a social justice mindset that has taken us from Abbotsford to Africa and places in between - believing we can make a difference, and last, but not least, Mouat's high academic status that is known across Canada.

When some people think of Mouat, they only see the tip of the iceberg. Most of them don't see what happens below the surface. To the world, we are merely 'characters' in this play of life. Mouat, our character is and will always be defined as reputation. A man once said, "When wealth is lost, nothing is lost; when health is lost, something is lost; when character is lost, all is lost." On stage, if you lose focus, or come out of character, the play is lost, the magic of the stage is broken. Each of us has our supporting actors, our friends, the ones who help us through rough times and have our back for us.

In a very hurried and chaotic world, we need to stop and remember what is most important. Mouat's mission statement is "Success for All". Grads of 2010, the success that will come out of this class is mind blowing: from innovation to imagination, the world needs us to make a difference, but you see, it is more than brains, brawn, and beauty. There is a plaque on my living room wall that says, "Home is where your story begins." Home is equal to the backstage, the rehearsals, the countless hours figuring out our character, but when we step on stage, or into Mouat, we become who we are. Our parents, guardians, significant adults are the directors and producers - in more than one way. Thank you to our producers and directors who have contributed to our developing character today. Who we are today is a direct influence of what has happened at home. The director can only give good advice to guide us to success, but the final forming of a person's character lies in our own hands, the hands of the actors.

As grads, our stage is Mouat. We run the show, but only with the help of our assistant directors do we go anywhere. Now, our parents, family, and guardians have been influential for developing who we are at home, as producers, but, at school, it is the teachers who have pushed us to use our heads, our bodies, and our hearts. These are the assistant directors. Some of these 'directors' like to make noises like, "KA KA", or make us color in math. Others give us nicknames, love to hear the latest school gossip, or give us wise words such as the words of Mr. Smith Sr., "ok yah, yah yah, ok okk k k just do it, yah yah." You have invested countless hours into our lives, making sure that when we go on stage, we look the part, and it will not go unnoticed. Thank you, teachers.

The Iceberg of Mouat 2010 has taken on a change - and it's not due to global warming. If I had to describe high school in one word it would be "egad". We have many scenes that we have taken part in, and we might have forgotten what exactly took place in Planning 10, Socials 11, Vinyl 12, or Science 9, but you will always remember that time when you fell down the stairs during block change, or accidentally called your teacher "mom", or when the Canucks failed in the second round and didn't make it to semi-finals *again*. All of these factors made high school. It was quick, shocking, and it made you smell like the Italian bread they serve in the cafeteria, or the smell of frantic teenagers trying to make sense of this play called ... Mouat. Some kids may keep falling down the stairs and calling teachers mom and forgetting lines, but some become inspired and decide to go to star in another play - more school.

Our goal in high school, and in life is to try and find a name for ourselves. We want to be someone, and Mouat, we are somebody. According to Shakespeare, the world is a stage, and we are merely actors on it. But we, as the grad class of Mouat 2010, stand for so much more. Sure we are characters acting on this stage, but we are the grad class that has, is, and will continue to make a difference in the world by stopping poverty in 3rd world countries, giving water to impoverished towns, standing up to slavery, raising awareness about the trafficking of animals and humans, and here in our hometown, helping our community fight homelessness. We raised the alarm in our school about the effects of landmines, and we went on hunger strikes, and we also celebrated our diversity by having multicultural fashion and talent shows. Not only do we stand up for what we believe in, we stand up for what is right. We just make sure our voices are heard.

I have no better advice to give you than from one of the most inspirational teachers I know, Ms. Frizzel from the Magic School Bus. She once said, "Take chances, make mistakes, and get messy." Fellow graduates, may our graduating class of 2010 be the class with character, that will take the chances, that will make mistakes in our scenes that will get messy. May we have a reputation that outlives each one of us. Our iceberg will always be remembered, and "the show must go on". Grads, whatever it is you know you should do, do it!

COMPLETION PROGRAM

International fee: \$750 per course
19 and older: \$400 per course

The academic completion program offers full 100 hour credit courses to students who have not taken a course before or whose percentage level was below the recommended level of success for the Academic Upgrade Program. A maximum of 1 course can be taken.

The following courses are being offered this summer:

- Grade 10 - English, Principles of Math, Science, and Social Studies
- Grade 11 - Biology, Chemistry, English, Principles of Math, Physics, and Social Studies
- Grade 12 - Biology, Chemistry, English, Principles of Math, Physics and Communications

UPGRADING PROGRAM

International fee: \$375 per course
19 and older: \$200 per course

Students who receive between 40% - 49% in a course are permitted to enroll in 50 hours of upgrading instruction. A maximum of two courses can be taken.
